It Takes a Village But What if Your Village is Gone?

Greetings Oracle readers and Maligayang Pasko (Merry Christmas)! My name is Maria Calcaben and I am one of the Resident Services Coordinators for the Housing Authority. My job is to help residents thrive and to help build up people, families, and communities. My job involves confronting problems and heartache but the strength to flourish through disasters of any kind is never an easy journey.

I was born in the Philippines but I grew up in America. I was always told I was "lucky" that my immediate family moved to the United States, the land of many opportunities, and prospered while most of my family is still thousands of miles away still left in a small, usually forgotten cluster of islands once controlled by the United States. I guess I didn't know how lucky I was until multiple disasters — including earthquakes, aftershocks, and typhoons — hit my family's homeland. Suddenly the small, usually forgotten islands were no longer invisible to the world but very much visible in a devastating way. On October 15, a 7.2 magnitude earthquake hit the island of Bohol. A few weeks later, the strongest tropical storm in history hit the Philippines with sustained winds of 196 MPH.

Closer to home, on October 30 & 31, Central Texas experienced one of the worst floods in years. Schools were closed, roads were underwater, homes were damaged, and many people were evacuated, including the C. M. Allen Homes. Many people stayed at the Activity Center until it was safe to return to their homes. What was to be a heavy rainfall desired by many to end the drought unexpectedly affected hundreds of lives in Austin, San Marcos, and surrounding areas.

So what do these two seemingly unrelated events have in common? It is the power of people, empathy towards other's pain, and the unity of communities that I have observed to have the most impact in making changes and giving relief. For example, during the Halloween Flood, residents from the Housing Authority went to bring food to people at the Activity Center. Others made calls to friends and families to assist them with their needs. Residents continued to demonstrate community by showing support for each other just as members of a tribe take care of their village. It is much the same with contributions flooding into the Philippines from around the world. My family in the U.S. continues to collect donations to send back to the island of

Bohol and surrounding islands that were affected by the typhoon. My family in the Philippines, although suffering damages on their homes, all seem to be fine. On her birthday, my Aunt Aster (right) cooked a feast of Filipino dishes and distributed all the food to people left homeless in her town from the natural disasters. Personal friends of all races responded quickly and actively with supportive words, prayers, fundraisers, and donations to send to the Philippines. (Continued on Pg. 6)
