Housing Authority & Community Action Partnership Helps Resident Make Fresh Start

Thirty years ago, Rosaura Rodriguez took a wrong turn on life's highway. She was skipping classes at school and hanging around with a bad crowd. She got into drugs but eventually got into drug rehabilitation. It took multiple attempts at rehab before she made a permanent change. Several years ago, her son, Jose, developed a brain tumor when he was about eight years old. By the time he turned fifteen, it became critical and had to be removed. Having children and dealing with life's crises has a way of turning people around. Rosaura was ready for a change. She knew she wanted something better out of life but didn't know quite how to make it happen.

She moved into the C. M. Allen homes last July. She had a nephew who was attending the after-school program at the KAD Korner Store, our Resident Services Center at that site, and then a neighbor told her that Bonnie

SELF-SUFFICIENCY PROGRAMS GET CONTINUATION FUNDING

Earlier this year, the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) awarded \$75 million in grants nationwide to help public and assisted housing residents to connect with local services to obtain education and training to find jobs. The San Marcos Housing Authority will receive continuation grants for both its Public Housing and Housing Choice Voucher Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) Programs. All total, the Housing Authority will receive \$102,520. These funds allow us to operate our long-standing and successful FSS programs.



In a press release announcing the awards, HUD said, "The Family Self Sufficiency (FSS) Program is a long-standing resource for increasing economic security and self-sufficiency among participants. HUD's Office of Policy Development and Research [PD&R] issued <u>Evaluation of FSS Program: Prospective Study</u> in 2011 that evaluated the effectiveness of the FSS Program. Conducted from 2005 to 2009, the study showed that financial benefits are substantial for participants who remain and complete the program. This study is the second of a three-part series that evaluates the effects of the FSS program. The <u>first study</u> found individuals who participated in the FSS program fared better financially than those

Residents from Allen Woods Homes have come together to celebrate the end of the year at the PODER Learning Center.



KAD teens enjoy a warm doughnut courtesy of Krispy Kreme doughnuts for all their hard work wrapping presents.











Pecina, the Service Coordinator, was very resourceful and was good at motivating people. Initially, Rosaura was thinking about how she might be able to use computers to work from home. Bonnie upped the ante and told her about the College Prep Academy that was coming up soon and gave her a flyer about it. Rosaura said Bonnie would also come and knock on her door to tell her about meetings that were going on at the KAD Korner Store. Rosaura said, "She doesn't give up. That's what's so awesome about her."

Rosaura decided to enroll in the College Prep Academy, which is sponsored by Community Action, Inc. of Central Texas. The primary goal of the Academy is to help people who want to attend college to be better prepared for the experience. Rosaura described it as a refresher course in reading, writing, and math. She said the program helped her to relearn things that she had forgotten or had never mastered in high school because she didn't care about getting an education in those days. The biggest challenge for her was to simply go there every day. She said, "The will to complete something was enough for me to overcome any challenges." Rosaura added that Francesca Ramirez, the Career Pathways Coordinator for Community Action, was very helpful to her during her participation in the Academy. She said that Francesca pushed her and the other students. Rosaura especially enjoyed a trip to one of the Austin Community College (ACC) campuses, which helped to familiarize her with the college environment. Francesca and other Academy personnel assisted her and other students to complete the enrollment process for ACC.

She has registered for classes at ACC and will be taking English and math this semester. Because of her participation in the College Prep Academy, her test scores were high enough that she was able to enroll in a regular English class. Because she is still struggling with math, she had to enroll in a developmental math course. She feels confident that she will overcome that challenge and said that one of her instructors from the Academy has agreed to tutor her this semester to help her to be able to successfully move on to college algebra. She plans to take other basic courses but her ultimate goal is to become a Licensed Chemical Dependency Counselor (LCDC). When asked about why she is interested in becoming a LCDC, she jokingly said, "I invested a lot of money into it in the past as a patient and now I just want to get my money's worth." The reality is that she wants to use her experience to help other people turn their lives around.

Rosaura said her son is very excited and happy for her and that he also pushes her. In an interesting twist of fate, we learned that Jose is also starting at ACC this semester. He is a junior at San Marcos High School but is involved in a dual credit program and will be attending ACC classes. Rosaura also has a daughter, Rocio, who is twenty-seven years old. Rosaura told us that Rocio is also very happy about the changes in her mother's life and that her extended family is very supportive.

According to Rosaura, "No matter how far or how deep you go down, there is always light at the end of the tunnel." Some people think that having to move into public housing means giving up on building a life for yourself but Rosaura said that moving into public housing was a big turning point for her. She said, "If I hadn't moved here, I wouldn't have learned about Community Action." She hopes

her story will inspire other residents who may feel as though it is too late for them. At the tender age of fortyseven, Rosaura is stepping out into a new life because she knows it is never too late to begin making your life better.

who did not enroll in the program.

"PD&R is currently working on a follow-up evaluation to the Prospective Study that tracks the outcomes of people who were still enrolled in the program at the end of the study. The third and final study looks at the effectiveness of the FSS program nationally. This will be the first national study of the FSS program and is part of HUD's Transformation Initiative that uses metrics and research to evaluate programs and gauge performance to encourage more transparency and accountability within the agency.
