Historic Flooding Hits Public Housing Site by Stewart Dale Spencer


In the wee hours of Sunday, May 24, a friend in Wimberley reported on Facebook that the Blanco River had been hit by 13 inches of rain. Soon after, I posted this: "There goes the Emergency Alert System again . . . this is going to be a Memorial Day Weekend to remember." I wish I had been wrong. The devastation from that event has reinforced why Central Texas is known as Flash Flood Alley. Because San Marcos does not have a radio station serving the general community and because of disruptions in the electric, cable, and cell phone grid, I had no idea that the San Marcos and Blanco Rivers had conspired to inundate much of the southeast side of town, an area that had not flooded in living memory. My first clue was when I ventured out later that day to run an errand to Walmart. The north-bound IH 35 frontage road over the San Marcos River was closed so I had to go around through the city and back out Hwy 80. Hmm. Walmart must have been flooded. I didn't immediately recognize the implication that if Walmart had flooded, that whole neighborhood would have to flood because the terrain is so very flat in what is, essentially, a natural flood plain.



It wasn't until I saw the damaged electric sub-station on River Road, followed by the sight of families putting their flood-soaked belongings on the curb at the C. M. Allen Homes, that I recognized the extent of the problem. I stopped in at the KAD Korner Store, our Resident Services facility at that site, and found standing water. Later that day, I was there with Albert Sierra, our Executive Director, pushing the muck out the door and wondering what the future would bring. Other Housing Authority employees were onsite talking to residents and trying to get some idea of how many homes were flooded and how badly. Only 4 homes and the management office had no

Hill County flood water. Later that day, the San Marcos Police showed up in their SWAT vehicle — not to bust down doors but to hand out water and food to anyone who needed it. We passed out flyers letting people know that a shelter was open at the San Marcos Activity Center and that they needed to remove themselves and their belongings from their homes so we could go in and begin the restoration process.

The first significant help we had was from the City of San Marcos. On Day 3, Bulldozers came out to load debris and ruined personal possessions into giant dumpsters. On Day 4, help arrived from the Texas Division of Emergency Management (part of the Dept. of Public Safety). Experienced personnel from the Texas Civilian Conservation Corps showed up to help us work on tearing out sheetrock. They also helped residents clean out their homes, especially elderly and disabled persons. Up until that point, progress in flood mitigation had been very slow because we had only our 4 maintenance personnel and 3 or 4 contractors. On Day 6, President Obama made a Major Disaster Declaration for Hays County. That was a Friday. By the following Monday, FEMA contractors arrived to begin making assessments of the extent of the damage. — *Continued on page 7*



On Day 1, Christopher Cruz was busy pulling flooded items out of his family's home. He told us that the evacuation warning came at 3:40 a.m. The water was up to his knees by the time they got out.

We are still assessing damage and working with FEMA and HUD to secure the resources we need for long-term recovery. For now, almost a third of our public housing stock in San Marcos is out of commission. Some units had extensive damage and will have to wait until the more lightly damaged units can be placed back in service. Almost every family has left C. M. Allen. In the first few days, there was a lot of confusion and emotions were running high, which is to be expected in a disaster situation. Some took to social media to express their anger and frustration against the SMHA and Albert Sierra in particular. I spoke with Mr. Sierra about the situation. He said, "Everything was done in coordination with our core staff, our Board, HUD, and FEMA. I even sought guidance from Legal Aid. They know real estate law. Some have said my initial letter was harsh but it was a serious situation. I don't want to evict people. We are getting legal counsel for those who refuse to leave [their flooded units] so we can repair them." Regarding the issue of June rents, Sierra said, "We waived rent for June as soon as we had authorization to do so. Initially, all we could do was waive late fees and refrain from processing evictions. HUD later said we could put units on a special 'casualty' status so that they would no longer appear on the rent rolls."




Best Food for Families, Infants, and Toddlers (Best Food FITS) is a community project started by the Nutrition and Foods department at Texas State University.
