HIGH MARKS FOR THE HOUSING AUTHORITY...AGAIN!

by Stewart Dale Spencer Recently, I visited with Albert Sierra, the Executive Director of the San Marcos Housing Authority, to talk to him about the recent designation of the Housing Authority as a "High Performer" by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The HUD Real Estate Assessment Center (REAC) looks at several indicators of the overall health of a housing authority. (See the April 2014 issue of The Oracle on the newsletter link at www.smpha.org.) Last year, the Housing Authority earned 91 of a possible 100 points. This year, that score was surpassed by 3 points. This was the result of earning the maximum score on the financial rating portion of the assessment (25 out of a possible 25 points). The Housing Authority improved its previous score by increasing its reserves. having good liquidity, and by having no significant debt. Sierra said the Housing Authority was very close to the HUD recommended level for operating reserves. He

said this was helped by the fact that our occupancy is so high and because residents pay their rent on time. Most people are surprised to learn that only about 40% of the Low Rent Program revenue comes from the federal government. Nevertheless, because rent is based on income, Sierra said the improved economy has resulted in higher average rents. He also noted that the Housing Authority is at 97% occupancy. This rate is based on unit months leased versus unit months available. Higher average rents and a higher occupancy level results in a better cash flow.

There was no change in the score for Management (23 out of 25 points) and Capital Fund utilization (10 out of 10 points). There was no change in the physical score this year (36 out of 40 points) because a HUD inspection is only required once every three years for high-performing housing authorities. Sierra said he doesn't take that for granted. He said the Housing Authority encourages residents to report damages and malfunctions within their units. With regard to the overall appearance of the properties, he said that Housing Authority people are always looking out for what's needed and doing their best to maintain the properties. He also said that the Maintenance Department turns vacant units around quickly and that the Public Housing Management personnel do a good job of getting units filled. Sierra said the Housing Authority has to use a lot of contract work because it's difficult to find qualified maintenance employees.




Love for the Neighborhood

Pedro had the ladies smiling as he took time to dance with each one of them. Residents are looking forward to April's dance when the theme will be *Western Showdown*.







Because of the good economy in Texas over the past few years, many qualified maintenance workers, for a variety of reasons, prefer to work as independent contractors.

Sierra said that a stable workforce and a good partnership of Housing Authority teams have been critical factors. In addition to Public Housing Management and the Maintenance Department, Sierra said that Resident Services Department programs and activities help improve the general level of happiness and satisfaction on the part of the residents. He talked about the many activities that go on at each site and that there are so many opportunities for residents to get connected to their neighbors. He also noted that in recent years there has been very little graffiti.

Finally, Sierra addressed the issue of volunteers. He said, "The Housing Authority is able to attract good volunteers because we have good people running the Resident Services Program." He got no argument from me on that point. We reminisced about the changes over the years and how when I joined the Housing Authority in 1991, the after-school program was run by 3 part-time Youth

Advocates and was limited to a small space in the C. M. Allen Homes office. There was more space at the Allen Woods Dining Room but the program was only 2 days a week at each site and served only about 30 children. Now, we have a nice facility and a full-time Service Coordinator at each site, serving all residents and over 100 children. We talked about how it has taken time to build up the relationships within and outside the Housing Authority that make the whole program work. We are looking forward to another successful year and a trail of improved lives at the end of 2015!
