

The Nelrod Education Fund (NEF) Scholarship for Underserved Youth

Deadline: June 2, 2017 Scholarship Notification: After July 31,2017

Purpose: To provide educational and personal development opportunities to empower underserved, low-income youth residing in public and assisted housing who demonstrate a mature work ethic and an extra-ordinary will to succeed despite a lack of traditional resources.

Award Components: I (one) \$1,000 Scholarship sufficient to encourage further education and to defray a portion of the cost and other materials. The number of eligible awards will be based on funding availability and the number of applicants.

Award Eligibility Criteria:

Applicant must be a current High school junior or senior, no older than 22 years of age. Must reside in government subsidized or other participating low-income housing provided by a Nelrod Consortium Partner Agency for no less than two years prior to award. (That includes the SMHA.) Must be member of a "low-income" designated family. All public housing and section 8 residents are eligible. Must be a "C" or "Near 'C" average student with a cumulative GPA not to exceed 3.5 or be lower than 2.0 on the 4.0 grading scale. Must have Work Experience, community service experience, or extra-curricular involvement. Must have plans to attend an accredited 4 or 2 year University or college, or other vocational, trade school, or career development program. Scholarship funds released to winners upon verification of College or trade school enrollment by the NEF. Note: Scholarship Awardees have one year post High School graduation to utilize scholarship funds.

GALLETAS DE MANTEQUILLA FÁCILES

Ingredientes

- -100g mantequilla o margarina
- 150g harina
- 50g azúcar
- Una pizca de sal

Batimos la mantequilla junto con el azúcar utilizando unas varillas manuales (recordad sacar la mantequilla un ratito antes de preparar la receta para poder trabajarla mejor).

Incorporamos la harina y una pizca de sal. Mezclamos bien con la manos hasta conseguir una masa sin grumos, envolvemos en papel film y ponemos en la nevera durante 30 minutos.

Transcurrido el tiempo, formamos pequeñas bolitas y las disponemos sobre papel de hornear o una lamina de silicona sobre la bandeja de hornear.

Con un tenedor marcamos el centro para dibujar unas bonitas rayas en las galletas y colocamos en el horno a 180º con calor arriba y abajo durante 20 minutos. El tiempo es orientativo, recordad estar atentos... Cuando lleguéis a los 15 minutos, tienen que estar doraditas pero no en exceso.

Transcurrido el tiempo retiramos del horno y dejamos enfriar sobre una rejilla.

To be eligible to receive a fan, a person must:

Have income at or below 200% of the poverty level

- ⇒ For individuals: Les than \$24,120 (gross) annual income
- ⇒ For couples: Less than \$32,480 (gross) annual income
- ⇒ See poverty guidelines for income requirements for larger families

AND

- Be over the age of 55 OR...
- · Be disabled and receiving disability benefits OR....
- Be in a household with children under 18 years of age

AND

Must be able to provide an ID and proof of income (examples below)

- Social Security/SSI/Disability
- Medicaid/Food Stamps Card
- Pay Check/Pay Stub


Head Start is accepting applications for the 2017/2018 school year. They are a major partner in our self-sufficiency efforts. You can get an application at the Resident Services centers at Allen Woods, CM Allen, and Chapultepec. Below are the basic eligibility requirements. Being in Head Start opens up a lot of resources that can benefit your family. If you apply, let us know so we can make sure they know you are one of our residents.

Age Eligibility

•Infants/Toddler/Pregnancy = ages 0-36 months old currently; Pre-School Age = 3 & 4 years old by September 1

Income Eligibility

- •The federal poverty guidelines are used to evaluate family income
- •90% of families meet 100% of the income guidelines and 10% are allowed to be over income.
