THE OCTOBER ORACLE

Herod King Ellison - A Retrospective by Stewart Pale Spencer

Herod Ellison passed away over the Labor Day weekend when his heart gave out. He had been performing with a band, as he

often did, and was reported to not be feeling well but evidently did not feel that he needed medical intervention. He died in his home sometime after the performance. He will be missed by many San Martians, including residents and employees of the Housing Authority, where he lived from 1995 to 2012.

Stricken with polio as a child, Herod learned to rise above physical limitations and the prejudices of the time. His presence was such that, once I got to know him, I saw his wheelchair as just another characteristic, like his dreadlocks and his booming voice. He got around on his own, rarely needing help. He had a modified van with hand controls instead of foot pedals but he refused to use a motorized wheelchair, saying he needed the exercise.



Herod experienced a metamorphosis during his time at the Housing Authority, taking advantage of the opportunity to attend Texas State University where he earned a Bachelor's Degree in Applied Arts with a minor in Science. He brought his unique perspective to an internship in the Office of Disability Services at Texas State University, where he worked to improve handicap accessibility on that hilly campus.

He went on to become a Master of Arts in Speech Communication in 2001, which seems fitting to anyone who ever heard him speak. If you closed your eyes while listening to him, you might think you were hearing James Earl Jones. People often told him, "With a voice like that, you ought to be in radio!"

Well, he was in radio for a few years. He was a radio personality at three different stations in San Antonio in the 70's. I think he did some voice-over work as well. Ultimately, he became dissatisfied with the working conditions and left radio. He also once told me that he did not like how the radio business had changed as large corporations like Clear Channel began acquiring local stations.



Herod applied his leadership skills as the President of the Allen Woods Resident Assembly, where he advocated for the residents in many ways including securing improved drainage from the City on one side of Allen Woods and recruiting volunteers to improve the Allen Woods playground. He also arranged for free cable television for the Meals on Wheels dining room at that site. In 2006, the City Council appointed Herod to serve on the Housing Authority Board of Commissioners, where he was the Resident Commissioner, later becoming its Chairman.

After 18 months of service, Herod resigned from the Board to accept employment as one of our Service Coordinators after the Housing Authority was awarded two major grants from HUD. In that position, Herod

helped us through a big transition. Our Resident Services Program was expanding. We were adding employees, vehicles, and services. We also had a change in leadership. It was an exciting time, filled with challenges and changes. Herod helped expand and adapt our existing self-sufficiency program to all of public housing. He started out at the Chapultepec office but later moved to the PODER Learning Center.

Retrospective - Continued from Page I He also worked two days a week at the C.M. Allen Homes. Over the years, he worked with many residents, encouraging them to persevere and bringing them hope.

Herod also took on the after-school program at PODER, bringing his creativity and energy to make it so much more than just tutoring and recreational activities.

After three years, changes in HUD funding required us to reduce personnel in that program from three to one. Herod chose not to re-apply for the new grant, moving on to other interests and eventually moving to Martindale.

I didn't see much of Herod after that but his successor, Maria Calcaben, has built upon his legacy, expanding the comprehensive nature of the services and activities coordinated out of PODER.



I had the pleasure of accompanying Herod on a trip to Galveston to accept an award from the Texas Chapter of the National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials for his work on The Oracle, which he created and inspired. On that trip, I got a chance to get to know him better and we talked about the major issues of the day. He had some interesting insights on the social and political changes during the years of the Vietnam War. You can read his Master's thesis by going to the Alkek Library on the campus of Texas State. Ask to see "Changing an image in turbulent times: strategies of the 1969 Black Panther party" by Herod King Ellison, published in 2001. It is not available for check-out but if we can arrange to have a copy made, we will make it available to residents who are interested in reading it.

"Herod affected my life because he shared his talent and humanity. He didn't let his disability [limit] him; his laughter was infectious. He was full of hope. The fact that he held a masters degree has inspired my drive to educate myself. My favorite memory would be one of the frequent conversations we had as I was walking and I would see him outside. The subject might be a Texas State professor we both knew, the Housing Authority we were both former employees of, being disabled, which we had both experienced, or many other things. We didn't always agree, either. But we could speak intelligently as friends. I miss him." - Catherine Welsh

"I have known Herod for at least 11 years. I loved the way he talked, sang, and joked around with everybody. When I first met Herod, I used to put my head against my wall just to hear him sing. He was the most smartest, greatest and sweetest friend and we love and miss him forever." - Lola Bell

"He was an inspiration to me especially when I first got my foot amputated and he told me to never give up. He will definitely be missed." — Beatrice Pacheco

"He was a good person and a happy man. He did a lot of things for me. He pushed me to vote and he invite me everywhere he goes where he played. He was funny" - Pablo Gomez
