college after her son Josh finishes high school next year. She states that her children's education is the most important goal in her life right now. Bea says that since she started working for Meals on

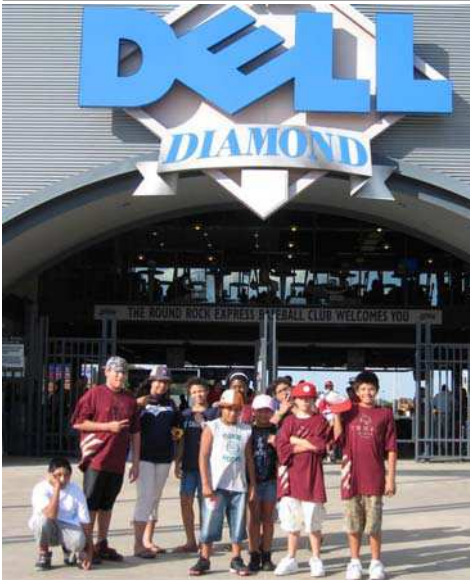

Don't Be Caught Breaking These New Laws!

- 1. Teen Drivers:** The laws for teenage drivers are getting tougher. Drivers younger than 18 are banned from using cell phones while driving (dialing, talking, texting) and the total hours required for behind-the-wheel driving instruction for teens is increasing from 14 to 34 hours.
 - 2. Driving in a School Zone:** The use of a wireless device within a reduced-speed school zone is prohibited. Cellular phones may be used while the vehicle is stopped in a school zone or with a hands-free device. The law also applies to bus drivers. Violators are subject to a fine of up to \$200. Note: Cities or counties wanting to enforce this law must post a sign at the beginning of each school zone to inform drivers that using a wireless communications device is prohibited and the operator is subject to a fine.
 - 3. Seat Belts:** All occupants of a vehicle, no matter their age, front and back seat, must wear seatbelts.

When we asked Irma what she would like residents to know about her she said, "I would like for everyone to know, I lived in public housing . . . and it is nothing to be ashamed of." She said that she knows what a single parent goes through living in public housing and she is proud of having come so far. She said, "I did it and others can too!"
