COLLEGE PREP ACADEMY COMING IN JUNE!

Are you a graduating high school senior and want to go to college, but feel you aren't ready? If so, the Community Action Summer CollegePrep Academy is for you. And it is free. The purpose of the Academy is to provide high school graduates and GED diploma holders with the academic instruction and college advising they will need to succeed in college. Although anyone with a high school diploma or



GED can enroll in community college, many high school graduates and GED holders do not know that the first thing they will have to do is take a college placement test in reading, writing, and math. Unfortunately, 60% of students who enroll in community college are placed into at least one non-credit Developmental (remedial) Education course, and almost half of these students do not complete their developmental courses within one year. In addition, developmental classes cost the same amount of money as regular classes. The Community Action College Prep Academy is designed to prepare students for college success so that they can spend their money on courses that count for a college degree. The Summer College Prep Academy will run for six weeks



beginning on June 15, 2015. Classes will be Monday through Thursday from 9 AM to 12 PM at the ACC San Marcos Goodnight Center. RSVP BY JUNE 5! Call Francesca Ramirez at (512) 392-1161 ext. 313.

BOARD OF COMMISSIONER MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The SMHA board of commissioners met on May 23. Present at the meeting were Rose Brooks, Gerald Brown, Gloria Salazar, and Albert Sierra. Absent from the meeting were Liz Trevino and Maggie Moreno.

Financials: Public housing has a YTD surplus of \$59,670. The Housing Choice Voucher program has a surplus of \$5,446 in administrative fees. Springtown Villa has a deficit of \$21,565. [Editor's Note: About \$54,000 in subsidy was pending receipt at the end of April.]

Occupancy: Public Housing is at 94%, Housing Choice Voucher is at 99%, and Springtown Villa is at 95%.

New Business: The Commissioners considered a resolution to adopt the revised Admissions and Continued Occupancy Policy (ACOP). The new policy was necessary because of changed HUD requirements, including special provisions required by the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). The new policy also incorporates amendments to the previous policy. No public comments were received. After a discussion of some of the provisions in the new plan, the Commissioners adopted the resolution. They also authorized the Housing Authority to submit an application for Disaster Recovery funds from the City's Community Development Block Grant program. The total cost to repair the 2015 flood damages at the CM Allen homes was \$1,516,141. About half of the repair cost came from FEMA, United Way of Hays County, donations, flood insurance from the Texas Municipal League, and the Public Housing Capital Fund program. The Housing Authority will ask for \$758,066 to recover funds we had to expend from Housing Authority reserves and from the San Marcos ReinvestmentCorporation, a nonprofit subsidiary of the San Marcos Housing Authority.

Directors Report: Sierra reported that the Housing Authority will be closed for Memorial Day. He also said that there will be a public hearing for the FY 2018 budget for the Public Housing Capital Fund program. There will be a public notice in the Daily Record and the meeting will be in June. He also commented on a scholarship fund from the NelRod Consortium for college-bound public housing youth. Finally, there will be a tour of SMHA facilities and programs for the Commissioners on June 6. The tour is sponsored by the Resident Services Department.
